Subject: Treforgan/Pentrepoeth Update

Hi Ceri,

In my report to the Community Council I said that I didn't believe that Treforgan or Pentre-poeth had been used after the beginning of the 20th century.

Talking with one of the older families in Morganstown they told me that they had a snuff/tobacco tin belonging to one of their family, who was a miner and lived in Springfield Gardens close to Bethel Manse.

The tin had his name on it plus the date 1907 and Treforgan. This suggests that Treforgan was still in common usage in the first decade of the 20th century.
