Remembering...

Armistice Sunday, 13th November, saw a good turnout at the War Memorial as usual. It also marked the half-way stage in the four year Commemoration of the First World War.

Some weeks earlier, 13th -15th October, the R&M WW1 committee had commemorated the half-way stage if the Battle of the Somme. It is difficult for us, a century after the event, to conceive of a battle that lasted 141 days, from 1st July to 18th November and which killed or wounded more than a million men.

The October weekend showed the excellent 75-minute Imperial War Museum film The Battle of the Somme. The film has been expertly restored in crisp black and white and a moving orchestral soundtrack added. As it was shown during the war, it is slightly "sanitised", showing hundreds of smiling soldiers. One fact that strikes home is how much they smoked and hardly a shot of soldiers can be seen without them puffing away.

However much the authorities tried to hide the true facts of the War, to us with hindsight, it was an immensely moving experience.

On a lighter vein a lunch on the Friday reproduced the meal that the Parish Council had given to the Eight year old Dylan was playing with his Nanny in the sitting room, while his Dad, sister and myself went to the shops.

His Nanny was on the sofa playing Pokemon cards with him, she decided to go into the kitchen but when she got up she felt really dizzy and sick. She asked Dylan to go and get her a bowl as she felt sick. When he brought the bowl back, Nanny had fallen to the floor.

At this point she was able to communicate with Dylan and he got her a pillow to put under her head. But he then noticed she was not responding to him, so he quickly remembered what he had learnt only a few weeks before at Beavers into action.

He put her into the recovery position and made sure she was comfortable. He then ran and found emergency contact numbers; he managed to ring us and tell us that Nanny had collapsed and was not speaking. We were just around the corner, so we managed to ring the emergency services promptly. Dylan was so brave and a little scared, but he acted amazingly and thankfully his Nanny is now getting better.



returning soldiers in 1919. In a community that counted 1,238 inhabitants in the two villages in 1911, about 120 had fought in the War, of whom fifteen were killed. The 1918 Council had set aside a substantial amount to buy 100 silver Vesta (match) cases for the returning soldiers, carrying the message "Radyr Grateful" and the soldiers initials, but they had to order more.

The 2016 meal consisted of cold meats and pickles and the caterers said that the most difficult thing was to get the pink blancmange to set. School choirs from the two primary schools gave a lively account of songs of the period, as specified by the 1919 programme. The one thing given a miss was the whist drive.

Death on the Hills

The highlight of the weekend was a concert in Christ Church on Saturday, 15th October. The R&M Choral Society, the Welsh Chamber Players, soloists Ellie Edmonds (mezzo soprano) Christina Mavron (violin) under the baton of Peter Esswood, gave a concert of orchestral and instrumental music, mostly composed during the War. The concert took its title Death on the Hills from one of the two pieces composed by Edward Elgar. The concert also included work by Hubert Parry and the Italian composer, Respighi, but the highlight of the first half was Vaughan Williams' The Lark Ascending for violin and orchestra.

By coincidence the concert fell a few days before the fiftieth

As we move towards the end of 2016 perhaps it would be an apt time to let you the reader know what the Radyr & Morganstown Community Council has been up to this year.

We have been active in managing the council's physical assets such as the Radyr Woods, the Granny Park, Danybryn Woods, Pentwyn Park and the Old Church Rooms.

In conjunction with the Radyr & Morganstown Association, we are now using the substantially improved and renovated Old Church Rooms, which has had a makeover and also an extension added. This building is the centre of our community's life and is the home of a wide variety of activities.

Throughout the year we have played an active part in assisting with the community's May Festival and have been instrumental in arranging and providing events commemorating World War One. We are about to take possession of the community's three Christmas trees, which will soon be erected and decorated ready for the lighting of the Christmas trees on Friday December 2nd. As part of this event carols will be sung by our two primary schools via lantern light from 6:00pm at the Granny Park and the Radyr Sidings. This will be followed by a similar event from 6:40pm at Windsor Gardens and then the arrival of Santa at Station Road where there will be many festive stalls, food and drink.

Your council has provided a grant to the YMCA who are running youth activities at the Old Church Rooms and is actively investigating the potential to run a lunch club for retired and older residents. Green Flag for Radyr Woods



In July, the Radyr Woods Community Nature Area was awarded a Green Flag Community Award by Keep Wales Tidy. The award recognises high quality green spaces in the UK that are managed by voluntary Community groups.

The work of the Wardens was also recognised by the RHS who awarded the Woods a Level 4 Rating indicating a Thriving Community space in their It's Your Neighbourhood Scheme.

This year has seen the 30th anniversary of the formation of the Radyr Woods Wardens group. The group was originally formed by the late Bill Clarke to create and maintain the footpaths in the woods making it more accessible for the local community. If you haven's discovered Radyr Woods yet they cover an area of about fourteen acres between Woodfield Avenue and Fisher Hill Way. The area was farmed and quarried up until the mid twentieth century but in medieval times the woods would have been part of the walled Deer Park surrounding Radyr Court, the historic home of the Mathew Family.

There is evidence that the area was inhabited in the Iron Age after a cooking hearth was discovered in 1911. This is now protected by CADW. A holy well dating from the 10th Century is also reputed to exist on the site.

In 2011, ownership of a final small section of the woods was transferred from Plymouth Estates to Radyr Community Council who fund the maintenance work undertaken by the wardens.

Working Parties take place about five times a year, generally on Saturdays and tasks include step building, coppicing, path maintenance and litter picking. More volunteers are always needed and no experience is necessary as training can be given. If you use the woods but don't want to help on a regular basis, you can still do your bit to keep the woods tidy by not dropping litter or by picking up any litter the next time you walk through. The second half was made up of John Rutter's moving Requiem, composed in 1985. Modern and yet completely accessible, it is one of his most performed works. Made up from the Latin Mass and English Psalms, I've not heard the Choral Society sing as well as they did in this work and it was fascinating to see the excellent orchestra in Rutter's muscular orchestration.

Our October meeting took place on Monday, 10th October when our speaker was Adrianne Jones alias "Bronwyn", a medieval herbalist. Dressed in authentic costume of the day she talked us through the medicinal properties of the herbs in use and also displayed a collection of medieval surgical instruments - not for the squeamish or faint hearted! This was medicine as practiced between the reigns of Richard III and Henry Tudor (i.e. 1485-1502) and it was a fascinating story which left us all feeling heartily thankful for our 21st century health service.

On Thursday, 20th October, we celebrated our fifty ninth birthday only one year to go to our diamond anniversary next year. Heather and Jane of "Tealicious Vintage Teas" provided a celebratory afternoon birth party which included delicious delicate sandwiches, freshly baked scones with jam and cream and a mouth-watering selection of home baked cakes. There was also the obligatory glass of fizz and endless quantities of tea and coffee, all served with great elegance. WI members had responded to the request to wear "garden party posh" and the outfits, particularly the hats, were impressive. It was a most enjoyable occasion and thanks must go to the specialist caterers but also tour hard-working committee who instigated and co-ordinated the whole event. Well done ladies!

The trip to the New Theatre on 10th November to see "Breakfast at Tiffany's" seems to have provoked mixed opinions. Perhaps our generations' memories of Audrey Hepburn in the 1961 film are just too strongly embedded. The play was seedier and, no doubt, more realistic, but a disappointment.

However, the speaker on Monday, 14 November did not disappoint. Rosemary Chaloner's talk "Women War Artists" proved to be fantastic and "the best talk of the year" according to feedback from members. To report on the

exposition in the detail it deserves would be impossible within the confines of this report as it centred on nine works of art, so I will make brief mention of the earliest and most recent artists. Kathleen Scott, born in 1878 was the widow of Robert Falcon Scott (the explorer) and the mother of Peter Scott (the artist). She was an artist and sculptor whose works were influenced by Rodin with whom she studied. Amongst many works of art, she produced several World War I memorial statues. The most recent woman war artist was born in 1945 and painted scenes from the Falklands War. Unlike previous women artists, she actually painted in the theatres of war.

The talk was especially appropriate given that it took place on the day after the Remembrance Day Parade and Service held in Radyr at the Monument on Sunday, 13th November. This year, our WI was represented by Jeanne Hughes, a committee member, who laid a wreath on behalf of Radyr and Morganstown WI.

Moving on towards Christmas – a coach trip to Bath Christmas Market is planned for Tuesday, 29th November. Hopefully, the weather will be fine as the setting for the pretty stalls within the Abbey Square is magical and speaking of Christmas stalls, our WI will be holding a festive produce stall and serving hot drinks and mince pies on Friday, 2nd December, when Radyr lights the trees and switches on the decorations.

Our Christmas meeting will take place on Monday, 12th December when the committee will be hosting the evening. The format, as always, is secret, so we wait to be surprised!

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

CHICKEN, BACON & SPINACH SAUSAGE ROLLS

A change from the ever popular sausage roll these are very tasty and healthier and useful to have in the freezer for the Christmas season. Makes 12

400g (14oz) spinach, stalks removed 1 dessertspoon olive oil 200g (7oz) bacon lardoons 1 medium onion finely chopped 3 cloves garlic very finely chopped 600g (11/4 lbs) minced chicken meat 40g (11/2 oz) dried breadcrumbs Leaves from 3 sprigs thyme or 1 tsp dried 1/2 lemon zest finely grated 35g (good 1 oz) Parmesan finely grated 250g (9oz) puff pastry Flour for dusting 1 egg lightly beaten Sesame seeds for sprinkling Oven fairly hot (follow directions on puff pastry pack) Spinach into large pan with 2 spoons water Cover and cook until wilted (approx 4 mins) Drain, cool, squeeze out excess water then chop Heat oil in frying pan Sauté bacon until golden and remove with slotted spoon to large bowl Sauté onions in fat until golden Add garlic and spinach and cook for few minutes Add to bowl and leave to cool Mix in the mince, breadcrumbs, thyme, zest and Parmesan Mix with hands and season Divide pastry into three rectangles -16x28cm (6x11") Divide meat filling into three On a floured surface roll each one into a sausage Place each sausage into middle of each pastry piece Brush one long edge with egg Roll pastry over meat with seam underneath Place in fridge on baking sheet to rest Cut each roll into four. Brush with egg and sprinkle with seeds Bake for approximately 30-40 minutes until golden and well puffed A.M.P.

Congratulations to the whole school community at Bryn Deri Primary on achieving the prestigious Eco Schools Platinum Flag Award, which was accredited on Thursday 30th June 2016. What an amazing achievement! A special congratulations and thank you must be given to the Bryn Deri Eco Committee, led by Mrs Vigliotta and Mrs Smart (Link Governor) who have worked tirelessly to ensure that this was a successful, whole school affair. Their determination has ensured that we are a school community that cares about our planet. We think global and act local!

The Eco-Schools programme has a simple framework, which provides the tools to promote and develop sustainability throughout your school. The Platinum Award is the highest award possible and comes after achieving four Green Flag awards Bronze and Silver. Only 10% of schools have achieved this award and we are exceptionally proud of this achievement. The award has taken in to account eight years of evidence and comes only eighteen months after winning the British Gas #100,000 Energy Makeover which saw the school benefit from solar panels and energy saving devices such as LED lighting throughout. Through following our Eco-Code and participation in a range of Eco-Schools campaigns such as Switch off Fortnight, Go Green Day and Sustran's Big Pedal the school has significantly reduced its carbon footprint.

The Eco-Schools assessment day began with a whole school celebration assembly, to celebrate our annual Go Green Day.
