

HALF MARATHON FOR R.N.L.I.



My name is Gareth Bird and I will be running thirteen unforgiving miles to raise vital funds for Atlantic College RNLI Inshore Lifeboat (ILB) Station. Atlantic College is an international sixth form establishment boasting a largely student run RNLI station responsible for rescue operations along 20km of the Bristol Channel.

During my two years at Atlantic College I was heavily involved with the ILB Station. After morning lessons had finished, myself and other student volunteers walked to the station to see what work needed doing. Some afternoons training boats would launch allowing practicing of boat handling skills, other days were spent in the

workshop changing wonky propellers or patching holes and when the sea was very rough we'd shelter in the station office and run through chart reading, navigation and radio communication skills.

Students wishing to join the college's RNLI operations make a two year commitment to join the Inshore Lifeboat (ILB) Service. The first year is spent gaining basic skills needed for lifeboat crews. In the second year, students join the lifeboat crew or train as RYA Instructors. I was asked by the Station Head to train with the RYA as a Powerboat Instructor. I subsequently worked in a close knit teaching team ensuring new students had the skills and confidence needed for their second year.

The Bristol Channel is one of the busiest shipping waterways in the world and is often hit by storms and high seas. It is therefore essential the Atlantic College RNLI crew are trained to the highest possible standards. Almost every afternoon the RNLI crew launch the lifeboat to undergo training exercises.

I was impressed by a paragraph in Dr. Gilham's introduction. "It is pointless to retire enwrapped in a wet blanket of nostalgia and regret. We can still live enquiringly, with a lively curiosity and interest during our final years".



Some of our members have to rely on lifts to and from the venues. It takes a short time to collect them from home and take them back home again, for some members it can be the only time they leave their homes. We also help with shopping library book changing, letter writing etc. and provide an information service. Most Good Neighbour Schemes are run by Age Concern we are one of two in the Cardiff area that are independent. The success of the Scheme is dependent on volunteers. The people we help are usually elderly residents who find it difficult to use public transport or to walk a great distance. No regular commitment is required. Even if you could only help us at certain times - school term, mornings, odd days etc we would be delighted to hear from you.

I am setting my sights on more moderately priced, but no less important, items. Below is a list of essential inshore crew kit.

Gloves: £16.

Drysuit: £319.

Thermal Suit: £82.

Helmet: £166.

Lifejacket: £222.

It would be wonderful to raise enough to cover the costs of some items; I'm sure a new drysuit with no leaks or a new pair of warm gloves would be very much appreciated by current and future crew members.

REDEVELOPMENT PLANS FOR RADYR AND MORGANSTOWN

Following the recent issuing of the "Radyr and Morganstown Village Plan Questionnaire" certain issues facing the community have been brought to light. The questionnaire was produced by the Community Council in order to help direct our communities' future and to compensate for the needs of the ever expanding community as a whole. A copy of the Village Plan Questionnaire Report can be found at www.radyr.org.uk

The questionnaire has helped to set out the potential for future development by addressing three main issues; the practical limits to further housing development, the potential for establishing jobs within the area so as to minimise traffic generation and potential future visions for the area.

The recent construction of three additional housing estates has led to a 50% increase in population; half of the community believe that there are too many houses in the area and the other half believe that there is the right amount. Therefore, the overriding opinion is that Radyr and Morganstown should not be further developed, but more public facilities including shops, transport links and community areas should be provided.

Other future plans and projects include promoting existing facilities, possibly investing in a community leisure centre, investigating the possibility of adventure play equipment, reviewing the use of Pentwyn Park, supporting a new cycle path to Hayley Park, investing in the Sidings Community Plot, improving community policing systems, promoting adults education courses, aiming to reduce congestion and traffic impacts within the community, extending the pavements on Windsor Road and many more schemes.

**RECORD EXAMINATION
RESULTS AT RADYR
COMPREHENSIVE**

This summer a record 87% of Year 11 students at Radyr Comprehensive achieved five or more higher grade (A*-C) grades in their GCSE examinations. This beat the previous record by over 7% and continues the upward trend of recent years. The past four years have all produced better results than at any other time in the school's history. Equally pleasing was the fact that over 99% of students achieved five or more A*-G grade passes – another record for the school!

A Level results were just as pleasing with a pass rate of over 98% and almost 60% of entries resulting in A*, A and B grades.

Headteacher, Steve Fowler, paid tribute to the hard work of students and staff and said "It is not just these record raw scores that pleased us so much. The fact that so many of our youngsters achieved far more than could have been reasonably expected of them is terrific. For some years now, our students have made more progress from Year 7 to Year 11, in academic terms, than those in almost any other school in Cardiff. They have achieved this whilst taking part in what is probably the biggest extra-curricular programme in the area. Whilst we're delighted with their successes it's so important that schools are more than just examination factories".

UPDATE FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Ruptured Water Main: (see photos on front cover). Once again traffic along Heol Isaf was disrupted but this time, with the benefit of the "rehearsal" two years ago, I was able to speak quickly with Welsh Water, the contractor, South Wales Police and Cardiff Council Highways Dept. We agreed a programme of actions which were explained on the local website and the nuisance was minimised. To reassure residents I met with Welsh Water to be briefed on the cause of the burst and the probability of a repetition. The main is fairly new, having been installed in the 1950's, is in good condition and should be fine for another fifty years. The cause was a failure of the valve feeding Radyr Reservoir (near Fairwater) and this created a significant back-surge causing the two bursts. This valve has been serviced and is being monitored closely. In some recompense for the problem, Welsh Water is donating £250. to Radyr Good Neighbours Scheme.

Radyr Weir: In a return to its industrial past the prospect is being assessed of using the weir to create industrial power. Installing an Archimedean Screw Hydro Turbine an output of approximately 400KW can be generated with an annual total of about 1.82MWh. The turbine is designed to be safe for fish passing through. I will provide further information as the project advances.

Disabled Access to Radyr Station: While I have been unsuccessful in persuading Arriva Trains to modify the access, they have conceded that they have an obligation to assist disabled passengers to travel by train. If the company is contacted about an access problem, it will suggest a solution, probably the provision of a taxi from Radyr Station to a station which has disabled access.

Local Development Plan: As I advised before, the initial plan has been withdrawn and a new plan is being prepared from scratch which will take four years. This has

potentially profound consequences form Radyr and Morganstown and I will keep you informed.

Policing: At a recent meeting with the Chief Constable and the Chief Superintendent responsible for Cardiff, I reiterated that our area has suffered a substantial cut in the level of policing and expressed concern that "intelligence lead policing" implied a willingness to neglect relatively low crime areas.

Radyr Library: Plans will be submitted shortly and the project to build a new, much larger library in Park Road is on schedule.

Surgery: I will hold a surgery in Radyr Library on Saturday, 6th November between 10am and 12noon. If you have a concern or want further information on the above issues or any other matter, come to the surgery or contact me, as set out below.

RADYR, MORGANSTOWN & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

Tending the autumn garden and harvesting the allotment came to a standstill for 26 of us on Wednesday, 8th September as the Gardening Club visited David Austin Roses at Albrighton and the nearby Wightwick Manor both close to Wolverhampton. We set out early from Radyr travelling through the Usk and Wye Valleys in early Autumn mists arriving mid morning to be met by sunshine and David Austin staff with a welcome cup of coffee and croissants. A conducted tour of the Rose Gardens followed; each of the walled gardens has a different theme with many roses developed by David Austin and still in flower. Our guide, Diana, is involved with the breeding of new varieties and was very knowledgeable on the history of David Austin Roses, the history and development of the rose and the cultivation and maintenance of roses. There were many questions from us all and it was only when lunch called that the discussions came to an end. After an excellent lunch the plant sales beckoned! Having spent our money and thanked the David Austin staff we moved on to Wightwick Manor and Gardens.

Wightwick Manor is a National Trust property, formerly the home of industrialist Theodore Mander. The house itself is a late Victorian manor house furnished under the influence of the Arts and Crafts movement and boasts works by William Morris, Rosetti, Burne-Jones and others. The formal gardens were designed by Thomas Mawson (Dyffryn Gardens). Some of the party opted to tour the house, others decided on a gentle stroll round the formal gardens and the new kitchen garden (now into its second year). From an interesting discussion with the Head Gardener we learned that the National Trust is developing the kitchen garden with varieties of vegetables in keeping with the period of the house; it will be interesting to see how it progresses. After a much needed cup of tea it was back on the coach for the return to Radyr.

Although it was a long day all agreed that it was an excellent day out and our thanks go to David Austin's staff, particularly our guide Diana and to our Chairman, Jane Parry, for organising the visits.

There has been considerable concern about the future of part of Radyr Woods. I am very pleased to say that much is being done by the Radyr Woods Wardens, with the backing of the Community Council, to secure it for the community. Some three quarters of this area is owned by Cardiff Council and the other quarter, the steeply wooded section below Taff Terrace, is owned by the Earl of Plymouth's family. The Community Council had a lease for 25 years from Lord Plymouth for the wooded section and we had been discussing the best future after the lease expired. We had hoped that Cardiff Council would buy the land so that they owned the whole area and the Wardens could continue to manage it as before. However, Cardiff did not want to take on the liability of ownership and neither did the Community Council. After much discussion when Lord Plymouth's land was put up for sale the plan now is for the Wardens to buy this part of Radyr Woods. The Community Council has met all the maintenance costs for the past 25 years and will continue to do so as part of its management agreement for the rest of the Radyr Woods area. Of course, other improvements have been funded by external grants awarded to the Wardens. When there is more news, we will put it on the website as well as the Chain.

The Friends of Danybryn Woods have met over the summer and continued to clear back the brambles. We found some hazel nuts which may have been opened by dormice so we are getting a formal identification. This is very exciting as dormice are not known to be numerous in Wales and are a European Protected Species.

The bye-election for Radyr South cost £2238 which was a little less than expected. That might sound a lot for 239 ballot papers returned but, of course, the cost isn't dependent on the number of votes and the higher the turnout the better the value!

On a more prosaic note, we will shortly be installing the last two new litter bins in Windsor Gardens bringing the total to six. These have helped stop litter escaping or being removed by birds. They are also fire-resistant which helps to minimize damage from some of the friskier visitors to the garden.

The weather summary - by John Trenchard

September means the days are getting shorter, the nights colder and damper and eventually we will have the first seriously foggy morning of the season with a crop of accidents caused by fog. However, is it the fog that causes accidents in these conditions? Without doubt, car crashes in this sort of foggy weather are caused by people who drive their vehicles too fast and too close together, simply unable or unwilling to adjust their driving pattern when visibility is poor; fog is defined as occurring when horizontal visibility falls below 1100 yards and thick fog when below 220 yards.


The well-known meteorologist, Henry Charnock, once put it "Situated as we are at the downwind end of the Atlantic, we should not be surprised that cloud and rain are essential ingredients of the average British summer". (Summer is defined as the months of June, July and August).

For Cardiff, this year's summer started dry but ended wet with rainfall of 18.1mm, 22% in June, more in July with 84.9mm, 106% and very wet in August with 154.00, 151%, despite no measurable rainfall from 27th August to 4th September as the active hurricane season in the west Atlantic and the Caribbean had now started.

August had two very wet days in Cardiff with 28.8mm on the 19th and 39.1mm on the 25th when the day maximum temperature only reached 15C, whilst 16C has been recorded in Cardiff in January. Since 1990 in Cardiff there have been five wetter Augusts with the most in 1997 when there was 254.1mm. Regarding summer rainfall, Cardiff receiver 257.0mm, 97% compared with 417.8mm in 2009, whilst the daytime maximum temperature was 20.7C, -0.7C with 2010 being the fourth year running with below average temperatures.

MORGANSTOWN MOTTE DRAWING OF MOTTE AND BAILEY

Motte and Bailey Castle



The next meeting of the R&M History Society will be held on Thursday, 11th November, when Dr. Amelia Pannett will give a talk on Cambrian Archaeology and the Morganstown Motte.

Last year Cardiff County Council commissioned Cambrian Archaeology to undertake a survey of Morganstown Motte which was undertaken by Dr. Pannett and completed last autumn. Unfortunately the discovery of an infection in the rhododendrons has resulted in the Motte being sealed off and much of the tree and ground cover cleared. Hopefully some work will be possible on the Motte in the not too distant future.

Morganstown Motte is the best preserved of a series of motte and bailey castles built by the Norman invaders of Glamorgan along the foot of Caerphilly mountain. This would have been the first frontier between the Normans and the Welsh in these parts. It would have consisted of an earth mound with a wooden stockade creating a wooden castle. At the foot of the mound would have been a small township. The earth bank which surrounded the township can still be seen to the east of the mound. When attacked the inhabitants of the township would have moved with their goods and livestock into the protection of the castle.

Some mottes had stone built castles to replace the wooden structure; a good example of this is the Norman keep at Cardiff castle, a stone building on a mound. It is unlikely that Morganstown Motte ever developed to that stage. While very important in the early stages of the conquest, commanding the entrance to the Taff valley and facing the Welsh castle at Castell Coch, it would have become redundant once the Normans had captured the kingdom of Senghenydd and built Caerphilly Castle.

The meeting on the 11th November will be held at the Old Church Rooms at 7.30pm. All are welcome.

Relief for Pakistan Flooding

An emergency appeal has been launched in order to raise funds for those affected by the tragedy that has come of the recent Pakistan flooding. The United Nations have declared that the countries worst flooding in over a century is now known to have affected over 16 million people and taken the lives of at least 1600 citizens. Although charities from all over the world have been quick to respond to Pakistan's cry for help, it is essential that aid continues to be provided for the remaining survivors. Fresh flood warnings mean that basic supplies are in higher demand than ever before, and it is essential to the wellbeing of the remaining survivors that aid continues to be sent to where it is needed.

Representatives from the British Red Cross have been situated in some of the hardest hit provinces, and have so far delivered aid in the form of food, clean water, shelter and medicine to over 35,000 citizens. Also the DEC, an umbrella organisation of 13 humanitarian aid agencies, is said to have successfully delivered essentials to over 300,000 survivors.

The biggest threat facing survivors at this point in time is the risk of

widespread disease, and the likelihood of a cholera outbreak leading to an epidemic. Tragically the reality of the situation is that contaminated water sources will inevitably lead to the spreading of disease, and the aid required to solve this problem simply isn't meeting the demand.


