



To the members of Radyr Community Council

I on behalf of Radyr Cricket Club wish to thank the Community Council for the grant which they so generously awarded us. As was explained in our application, the money was going to be used for hiring venues for our various age group teams and coaches, if that proved necessary. Since then, the money has been spent on hiring venues at the Radyr Comprehensive School and the Swalec Stadium indoor school and due to our club volunteers, we have not needed to pay for coaching, which has meant more sessions for our young members. The numbers have been very impressive with over seventy children from eight to fifteen years of age taking part and improving their general cricketing skills. Our club is determined to give as many boys and girls an opportunity to play cricket to the level their skills and desires take them. It is an expensive business and it is only with the help of organizations like the Community Council that the club can cater for what seems an ever increasing demand. With the new houses being built in Radyr this situation is only going to increase.

One of the nice things about involving ourselves in youth cricket is when a boy or girl uses their talent and achieves the milestone of an International cap. Over the last few months seven Radyr members have been nominated in various age group Wales squads, which takes us to fifteen in the last twelve months. I have no doubt that all of these children will achieve great things in the 2018 season and without exception they have benefited from the coaching paid for by the Community Council.

In conclusion, can I, on behalf of the club's young members, thank the Community Council for their donation which has set them on the path of loving the game of cricket and sport in general.

It was a bitterly cold day but the hardy souls of the Taff Trailers Social Link Group who completed the walk to Morganstown Village Hall were rewarded with the warming leek and potato soup, bread and cheese, welsh cakes and hot tea and coffee – now the traditional lunch following the walk.

For the first time in its history, the presentation of the Eisteddfod cups to the local primary schools on St David's Day could not take place because the schools were closed due to heavy snow. The cups were duly presented to the winners at the postponed ceremonies, Evie Williams from Bryn Deri and Millie Jones from Radyr Primary. Both of the winning welsh themed poems were read out at our March meeting and were well received by members. Congratulations to the winners.

It was our WI's turn to host the Social Group Link event this year which will be a Beetle Drive, with tea and cake of course. It took place on Wednesday 21st March at 2.30pm to 4.30pm in the New School Rooms.

Other community activities by our WI include a donation of £100 profit made from our hot drinks and mince pies stall at the Christmas Tree Lighting event to the Dan-y-Bryn Cheshire Home towards their garden project. In May, we will be providing the teas at the May Day crowning ceremony during the Radyr Festival. The festival's chosen charity this year is the Alzheimer's Society so please support the activities – there is something for everyone.

Our speaker for February was Jordan Taylor Boskana, the Learning and Outreach Officer from the Cardiff Story Museum. Her role involves her running learning groups and training and supporting community groups in the delivery and creation of their own heritage projects. She

brought with her artefacts, stories and photographs which depicted the many varied aspects of Cardiff's social and industrial history – a very interesting talk enjoyed by members.

The weather may have been miserable for the first three months of the year but we have enjoyed three high quality speakers. The one in March proved inspirational. Sara Pickard's talk was entitled "I've got Down's Syndrome.....so what!!!" Sara is 34 years old, grew up in Pentyrch, was educated in Pentyrch Primary, followed by Radyr Comprehensive, where she gained 10 GCSEs, and then a Business and IT course at Pontypridd College.

She has worked for Mencap Cymru for eleven years on various projects, three of which were in South Africa, to benefit young people with learning difficulties. She has represented Mencap in Europe, speaking at conferences in Rome, Prague and Madrid, as well as in Orlando and at the United Nations Headquarters in New York.

During 2009, she joined the Hijinx Theatre group and toured the country for 3 months playing the lead role in the play "Miss Brown to you", later playing Girda in the dramatic adaptation of the Hans Anderson story "The Snow Queen". She is still acting with the Odyssey Theatre as well as being a local Community Councillor for nine years. In 2010, she was the recipient of a "Service to Wales" award at the prestigious venue of Ruthin Castle. 2012 saw her as a torch bearer for the London Olympics, one of her favourite experiences. One of the highlights of her talk was the production of the actual torch used.

Finally, for International Welsh Women's Day on 8th March, the Western Mail report listed Sara as 44th out of the top 100. What a record! and an inspiration to all who witnessed her energy, commitment, enthusiasm and humour. At the end, she had a spontaneous standing ovation, well received.

By the next edition, the Radyr Festival will be over and our own Annual Meeting will have taken place. Please consider joining the committee – our Institute cannot run itself.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

PEAR COBBLER

A very satisfying and homely pudding. Rhubarb, plums or apples could be used. It is quicker if you have a food processor.


Serves 4

1kg. (2lb) ripe pears
225g. (8oz) caster or brown sugar (or less)
150ml.(1/4 pt.) water
125g.(4 1/4 oz) S.R. flour
75g.(3oz) cold butter diced
50g.(2oz) ginger biscuits, blitzed to a powder
or place in a strong paper bag and roll with a rolling pin
1 large egg
3-4 Tbspns. milk
Ice cream or cream to serve

Peel and core pears.
Chop into bite sized pieces.
Place in pan with 150g.(5oz) sugar+water.
Place over med. heat until pears soften.
Tip into 1.5 litre(2 1/2 pt.) baking dish
Prepare ginger biscuits, put aside.
Preheat oven 160C/Gas 3
Pulse blend flour+butter or rub together until resembles breadcrumbs.
Add remaining sugar+biscuit crumbs.
Pulse or stir.
Add beaten egg + enough milk to make a soft dough.
Top pear mixture with spoonfuls of ginger dough.
Bake 40-45 mins. until golden and juice breaking through crust.
Allow to cool a little before serving.

only to discover he must forfeit the love of his 'girl' Sally to claim his birthright. The musical score of the show features such well-known numbers as 'The Lambeth Walk' and 'Leaning on a Lamp Post'. The latter song, made popular by George Formby, although written by Noel Gay, did not appear in the original production.

Things got off to a brisk start, with the company's bright rendition of 'A week-end at Hareford'. Then came our introduction to the single-minded personality of Lady Jaqueline Carstone, well characterised by Lesley Collier-Roberts. Her 'Thinking of No-one but Me' duet with the Hon. Gerald Bolingbroke, very ably portrayed by Gareth Hurman, was really well-done. 'The Family Solicitor' number introduced the character of the song title. Solicitor Hubert Parchester, was superbly played by Alex Brent, with a delicate, humorous touch, and entirely believable. Angela Sadler, gave another of her polished performances as the Duchess of Dene, prior to the arrival on scene of 'the heir'. Mike Gelder's experience and stage craft was evident in his portrayal of cockney Bill Snibson, and Bethan Sims brought a light touch of innocence and honesty to the character of Sally Smith; a suitable contrast to Bill's brashness.

'An English Gentleman' was a well-sung showcase number for the domestic staff cast of characters, and Lady Jaqueline and Bill's close interaction during the number 'You would if you could' was amusingly cheeky. All the company were enthusiastically involved in the signature Act 1 closer 'The Lambeth Walk', which showed off the rehearsal work done to perform the choreographed movements, and equally importantly, the several changes of key the musical arrangement demands.

Act II opened with the bright,



enthusiastic company rendition of 'The Sun has got His Hat on', and Sally's poignant reprise of 'Once you lose Your Heart' from Act I showed off the quality of Bethan Sims' singing. The 'Song of Hareford' clearly demonstrated Raymond Rivron's creative approach to stage and scene setting, as the 'ancestors' were illuminated in ghostly light behind their portraits, before emerging to join in the number. This scene contrasted nicely with the related dialogue between the Duchess and Bill, and his predictable – but nonetheless amusing – fight with the tiger rug in his taunt of the Duchess's pronouncements on 'family' values. The rendition of 'Love makes the World go Round' by Parchester, Sir John and Bill, a scene of mildly-inebriated, slightly comic interaction, was well performed by all three. A bright finale with a, perhaps expected, reprise of 'The Lambeth Walk' rounded off an enjoyable evening's entertainment.

Congratulations to Bev Jones as both director and choreographer, and all involved – both on and off stage – for a really good production. Stage setting and related props were of the usual high standard, set and maintained by Raymond Rivron in his work for the group (ably assisted by his wife Marilyn). Musical direction was again in the hands of the very capable Ben Pinnow, with the help of Helen

Roberts as rehearsal repetiteur. Ben also led a fine orchestra in providing the essential instrumental accompaniment at performances. Costumes, from Just Fancy of Barry and cast members' own wardrobes, helped to further enhance the visual elements of the performance. Further support was also provided by the many volunteers – both Group members and friends – who checked and sold show tickets, raffle tickets, and staffed the licensed bar. And so we look forward to the Group's next production, 'How to succeed in Business without really Trying', in February 2019.

Following a snowy start to March another exciting season is upon us. Ground preparation and pre-season are in full swing!

The 2017 season does seem a distant memory however I felt it worthwhile to mention some highlights in dispatches.

The First XI finished a little off par in mid table of the South East Wales Cricket League div 2 but recorded some handsome victories including the eventual run away leaders Abergavenny. It was encouraging to see the clubs youth policy bearing fruit as on three occasions during the season the First XI consisted of six U21's. Congratulations to James Cady achieving 'player of the season' and Ben Thomas making his First XI debut.

A special mention must go to the Second XI, champions of the SEWCL div 2 Second XI league in a close fought contest coming out deserved victors winning thirteen of their eighteen games only losing two along the course of the season.

Congratulations to Pete Clegg and the squad! 'Cleggy' was the stand out performer leading the way with the bat scoring over five hundred runs at an average of 57, taking 24 wickets at an average of 12 topping it off with 5 catches and 2 run outs!

Credit must also go to two youngsters making their way through the ranks of the club, Tom Neil who put in a solid display throughout the season proving his worth to the top order with some mature performances. Secondly to Taylor Burns who racked up 120 overs for the season taking 27 wickets at an

average of 16 as the spearhead of the attack.

She headed both the runs and wickets averages and aggregates for Wales Under 15s, was part of the Under 17 team which reached the National Finals and made her Wales Senior Ladies debut. At the end of the season Sophie was selected as the youngest member of the Western Storm Regional Academy and as one of 4 women and girls in the full Glamorgan Academy. 

Lunch club for elderly residents may struggle to survive

It's easy to think that Radyr and Morganstown are parts of Cardiff that do not suffer the kinds of problems faced by other parts of the city. This, after all, is a relatively wealthy area and, as we know, a little money can help solve many of life's problems!

But there are some people in Radyr and Morganstown who could do with a little help. This includes many of our older residents who find themselves, for a variety of reasons, with very little company. To make matters worse, some of them can no longer drive - and this makes their isolation more difficult to bear.

Radyr and Morganstown Community Council wants to help these residents. It wants to provide them with opportunities to spend time with other people - and to enjoy a wide range of activities as they do so. As a first step, the council is working in partnership with Age Connects (the charity which helps older people), which has already established a lunch club which meets in the Ty Nant on Fridays.

'The lunch club is off to a good start'

according to Martin Smidman, the Age Connects coordinator 'but we need to do more! Our hope is to hold some of our lunch events in places such as the Old Church Rooms, where we can provide guest speakers and other activities for our elderly residents to enjoy.'

'Unfortunately, Age Connects cannot provide this service forever - and we will have to turn our attention to some of our other priorities towards the end of the year. Because of this, we need to recruit a band of volunteers who can take over and develop what Age Connects has started, with the assistance of the Community Council.'

'It has been wonderful to see the response of the elderly people who have attended the lunch club to date - and it would be such a shame if this service had to end later this year.'

'Age Connects has managed to recruit some excellent volunteers, but we need four or five more, to help take this project forward.' added Councillor Huw Jones, from Radyr and Morganstown Community Council. 'We need people who can cook simple lunches; people who can transport elderly people who cannot drive (for which 50 pence per mile can be paid). We need, most of all, someone who can lead this project - and provide some great experiences for these people who will, otherwise, spend much of the week alone.'

REPORT FROM THE RADYR AND MORGANSTOWN COMMUNITY COUNCIL – MARCH 2018

Residents of both villages will have seen the devastation that has occurred at the south end of Heol Isaf, the junction with the A4119 and all along the A4119 almost to Groesfaen. The title of a famous book 'The Rape of the Fair Country' springs to mind. Furthermore, both the increase in construction traffic and intermittent traffic lights all add up to travel delays and an increase in atmospheric pollution. This outcome was predicted by many residents along this road and supported by all aspects of local societies. Many also blame the Developers for this devastation but they are only working within the constraints allowed by the Planning Authority.

There is nothing that can be done in regard as to what has occurred. The future philosophy is basically damage limitation. How can this be achieved? Your Council will monitor and examine all new proposals and respond accordingly. Currently, letters have been dispatched to various bodies. The first has been to Arriva Trains Management with a request to adjust the fare stages between Taffs Well, Radyr and the centre of Cardiff. The objective is to try and encourage passengers to use the more distant stations and so decrease the cars that fill up Radyr Station Car park early each morning. In addition, such actions will hopefully reduce traffic flow along Heol Isaf and along the Kings Road during the rush hours. The spin off for this strategy will be that there will be increased road safety at all times particularly during the local school runs. The second letter has been dispatched to Cardiff City Council requesting that their transport department monitor and reduce the flow of Heavy Goods Vehicles [HGV] along Heol Isaf. The objectives here are several and include increase in road safety, reduced pollution and to prevent further road damage along Heol Isaf. A response has been received from the City Operations Department who are monitoring both road safety and accessibility issues in the city. A report will be produced later this year. In the meantime, the Council continue to press for traffic control measures to be established along Heol Isaf. In addition, the Council has been in contact with the developers and their suppliers, both by letter and at meetings, pointing out that there are both weight and speed restrictions along Heol Isaf. Currently, the developers are handing out leaflets to the HGV drivers warning of these restrictions.

There is no doubt that when the new houses are purchased, surrounding schools, medical, dental, and hospital facilities will face increased demands. These problems will have to be resolved and will increase the workload of everyone concerned with the wellbeing of our community

Your Council and Councillor McKerlich strongly supported the objections of the Sidings residents against the proposed development. The main objection was the density of the units along with other issues which included access to, and from facilities, particularly to local schools. This will go to the Planning Committee later this year

I attended, along with Councillor Rod McKerlich, the recent meeting of the Police and Community Together – PACT- at the OCR. It was disappointing to record that only around ten residents were present. This meeting allows residents to put forward their views to the police and, in return, receive information of police activities in our areas. Could I encourage more residents to attend at future meetings. David Cargill normally loads the relative dates of these meetings on the local website.

The debate regarding the possible alteration of the Welsh name for Morganstown from Treforgan to Pentre-poeth continues, albeit slowly. There are supporters for each of these place names. The Council will, of course, remain in contact with the residents of Morganstown to keep them informed of any developments.

I am aware that this article has a small amount of positive solutions to the problems faced by our communities. However, residents can rest assured that your Council and Cardiff City Councillor Rod McKerlich will continue to represent our community to ensure that the best possible outcomes are achieved.

This is an incredibly large number for such small villages. We also plan to commemorate the nurses and civilians who worked in the hospital on Heol

Isaf. So don't be surprised if someone knocks on your door to ask permission to put up one of these display boards. The students at Radyr Comprehensive are working on finding out where these houses are - sometimes we only have a house name and some of these have been changed.

A three day Festival will take place over the days immediately prior to Sunday 11th, including a concert, an afternoon tea, a dinner in the Golf Club and a showing of the film *Oh! What a Lovely War*.




FILM CLUB
