Events will kick off on the evening of Friday December 4th. The Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Cardiff have done Radyr and Morganstown the great honour of agreeing to switch on the Christmas Lights. That is our very own County Councillor Rod and Mrs Sue McKerlich. Because of the restrictions there will not be a Christmas Fair in Station Road this year. You are asked not to congregate in the centre of Radyr to meet with current restrictions and the event will be available on YouTube from 18.50 by using the following link: radyr.org.uk/ChristmasLights

As well as the lights on the Christmas Tree in Windsor Gardens, the Community Council have ordered new lights for Station Road and new lamp post fitted lights in Station Road, Heol Isaf and on Main Road, Morganstown. The tower of Christ Church will also be lit up as it was to commemorate the end of

World War One in 2018. Two other Christmas trees will be placed in the "Granny Park" in Morganstown and in the Sidings.

The RMA will have put up ten smaller Christmas trees above the shops in Station Road.





Morganstown News

TfW and Morganstown.

Over the past few weeks Transport for Wales (TfW) have been unveiling their plans which will have a great impact on Morganstown village and parts of Radyr in the short term. The press office for TfW did not respond to a request for a statement from The Chain, so most of this information has been gleaned from various briefings. Unfortunately much misinformation has been circulating on the web and we hope to correct it here.

The Radyr and Morganstown Association held a meeting with four representatives of TfW on Monday 16th of November. Between seventy and eighty people joined this meeting via Zoom. Two senior representatives of TfW and the Contractors were present at the meeting and they have experience of working on both the London cross rail link and the electrification of the main line into south Wales. This meeting and its many interesting questions, is still available to be viewed on the Community web site. A letter on the subject from our County Councillor, Rod McKerlich, is also included in this edition.

- The electrification of the Valley's line is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2022.
- Gelynis Farm has been sold to the Welsh Assembly Government as part off the project, we understand that the farmhouse and some of the land around the house, which is a scheduled monument, is not part of the sale.
- TfW has asked Cardiff County Council to use part of

- Morganstown Mound Field as a works base for the duration of the work on the line. It will be restored to its present function at the end of the project, in theory and provided that work does not overrun, during 2023. There will a net gain in that both the playing pitches and the changing room facilities will be improved at TfW's expense. One football pitch will remain while the work goes ahead.
- The base will be used overnight and at weekends to access the line and the representatives of TfW addressed the question of noise and light pollution. Deliveries to the base will be during the day, via the lane at the side of Pugh's Garden Village and will come down from Treforest in convoy. No work will take place at the base it will only give access for workers, equipment and materials to get to the line north of Morganstown.
- It will be one of three bases on the section between Radyr and Pontypridd, the others being at Upper Boat and Treforest.
 Treforest will be the main base.
- A completely separate project will be the building of a bridge over the line between the present level crossing and the motorway. TfW feel that with up to 24 trains an hour on this section of line the present level crossing would be dangerous. No date was given for the completion of this bridge.
- Work on this project would take place in the field at the side of the lane leading to Gelynis farm and the motorway. The bridge and its associated road will start just after the Nant goes under the lane and curve around to reach the river side of Gelynis.

- Work on this project will be during normal working hours, except for a short period when the bridge will be moved into place overnight.
- Concerns have been expressed that a two lane road over the bridge would be a gift to future developers wishing to develop land between the railway and the river. At the moment this land is designated green open space and part of the flood plain.
- The contractors will give a twenty four hour help line which we will publish once it's released.





In the meantime, the Radyr and Morganstown Community Council has continued with its work, under the difficult circumstances we all face.

Following a fairly grim and dismal 2020, and with so much of Christmas cancelled (no school plays, no pantomimes, no Christmas parties etc) the Community Council has decided to bring some festive light into the community, as follows:

We will be enhancing our Christmas display, with new and improved lights along Station Road, Christmas decorations on lamp posts in the centre of Radyr and Morganstown, more lights in Windsor Gardens - and beautifully decorated Christmas trees in the Sidings, the Granny Park and Windsor Gardens


we have invited Father Christmas to visit Radyr and Morganstown. He will be touring the community on 4 December in his spectacularly decorated sleigh, stopping briefly at Station Road to meet Cardiff's Lord Mayor (Cllr Rod McKerlich) and to present his 'Zoom Christmas message' to our children (if the technology works!)

we have also asked Micky and Minnie Mouse to repeat their much-loved lockdown walkabouts - and they will be doing so on 19 December (weather permitting)

we are also launching a Christmas Competition! There will be prizes on offer for the best decorated houses. You can read more about this in a separate article in this Chain.

Mickey and Minnie will find it safer to walk around Radyr and Morganstown, of course, thanks to the three new zebra crossing that Cardiff Council has been busy installing. This will make it easier for residents to cross our main road at key points along its length. We also want to see the old zebra crossings made safer (by tabling them, for instance). We will continue to discuss this with Cardiff Council.

In addition to the zebra crossings, we are now living in a 20mph zone.



from 2030, this should not be a

problem.

Another transport issue is the work on the South Wales Metro. This will involve electrification of the Valleys Lines and the introduction of brand new trains (much of which will be built in Wales). In addition, the number of trains travelling from Radyr into Cardiff, and vice versa, will increase from 6 to 12 trains per hour.

A major concern, however, will be the creation of a large 'works compound' on the Mound field site in Morganstown. Transport for Wales tell us that this will facilitate the building of a new vehicle and pedestrian bridge over the railway line, which will replace the existing pedestrian crossing near Gelynis Farm. With 24 trains per hour (12 heading north, 12 heading south) the existing crossing will no longer be safe. The compound will also be an access point onto the railway, where work will take place at night to install the infrastructure needed for electrification. This is of immense concern to Morganstown residents living near the compound, who will face noise and light pollution through the night. The Community Council will discuss this matter before responding to the proposals.

Now, for some more unfortunate news. Although we live in a great part of Cardiff, with a great community, we are visited sometimes by acts of ugly vandalism. The latest incidents happened on the night of 14 November, when the nurse and soldier silhouettes in Windsor Gardens, commemorating the 100th anniversary



of the end of World War One were destroyed, leaving razor sharp edges on the remains.

It is hard to believe that the persons responsible gave any thought to what they were doing. During the war, over 700,000 British soldiers were killed, defending our way of life. Some of those soldiers came from Radyr and Morganstown. Some of their families live here to this day. The level of disrespect was sick and disgraceful. At the same time, lights and candles displayed to celebrate Diwali were smashed and destroyed - showing huge disrespect to our much-loved Hindu, Jain and Sikh friends. Again, we utterly condemn this stupid and moronic act.

We encourage anyone who knows anything about these incidents to contact the police on 101. If you feel nervous about doing so, why not talk to someone else first? We cannot, and will not, live with ugly acts of vandalism in our community. Although the vandals may live outside Radyr and Morganstown, if anyone involved is reading this article, please know that we hope you are found - and that the sentence for criminal damage includes community orders, which can include up to 300 hours of unpaid work - whilst being supervised by the Probation Service for twelve months. Any subsequent criminal record has to be disclosed to employers, potential employers and in applications for places in University.

In the meantime, other work continues. We are working with the residents of St Philbert Street to challenge how Redrow Homes and Cardiff Council propose to improve drainage at the site (Cllr Rod McKelrich has written an excellent letter to Cardiff Council about this) - and we continue to work with Cardiff Council following the award of a Welsh Government grant for them to investigate serious drainage issues at the Drovers Way playground site.

We continue to look after our treasured Radyr Woods, with coppicing underway recently, thanks to the excellent Cardiff Conservation Volunteers.

Despite receiving a terminal prognosis of Neuroendocrine cancer in January 2019, Peter continued to take an active interest in lifelong hobbies such as opera, classical music, Egyptology, gardening, walking, and would like nothing more than to debate current affairs with friends ... and anyone who would engage! Although his health was failing, Peter and his second wife, Hilary, continued to enjoy holidays in the UK, feeling fortunate to have explored many parts of the world together during their 33 years living in Radyr. Peter died at home on 3 October, his funeral being held in Christchurch, Radyr, twelve days later.

Many local residents will have known Peter as an enthusiastic member and volunteer of Radyr Golf Club. Others will have heard his rich bass voice when rehearsing and performing with Radyr Parish Music Group over many years.

Growing up in Carlisle, Peter found his singing voice in St Cuthbert's Church choir, and practised his sporting skills playing cricket all over the north of England, although, then, he would have preferred his batting average to go up just as, later, he would desire his golf handicap to go down!

Despite leaving school at 15, Peter built successful careers in two different fields, first as an engineering draughtsman, and later in the financial services industry as salesman, trainer officer, and regional manager.

Peter was loyal, trustworthy and respected, an altruistic philanthropist, helping his first wife, Delysia, run the local scout group in Bramhall, acting as a School Governor, serving as a Liberal councillor on Stockport Council, volunteering with the Citizens' Advice Bureau in Cardiff, and always ready with practical help for friends and neighbours.

Proud of his sons, Tim and Jeremy, Peter was especially thrilled to have musically talented grandsons, Tom (piano), Guy (violin), and Joel (yet to be chosen!). Remember Peter with joy and gratitude for a long, fulfilled life. Out for 85 - a definite improvement on his batting average!

The old wooden statue was removed and burnt under Thomas Cromwell's direction.

It had reportedly been a nice little earner for some local monks!

Pauline's love of the works of Gilbert & Sullivan, opera and musicals began when she was old enough to join her mother Gladys singing in Leicester Choral & Dramatic Society. A talented pianist and organist, Pauline studied for a music degree in London and one of her proud memories was the opportunity to play the Grand Organ in a student concert at the Royal Albert Hall.

In 1967 she married Tony and moved to Peterborough where Tony worked in a bank. As well as private piano pupils, Pauline taught music at Stamford High School and she and Tony, an accomplished tenor, joined the local Operatic Society. Tony's job took them to Norwich and eventually to their home in Radyr.

They joined Radyr Methodist Church where Pauline played the organ and Tony became a lay-preacher on the local Methodist circuit. They also joined Penarth Operatic Society where Pauline later became their Musical Director. Pauline taught piano at home and in their spare time she and Tony entertained audiences at local care homes and churches. In 2003 Pauline joined Radyr Parish Music Group as accompanist and immediately became an indispensable fixture for the next 15 years. Tony occasionally performed in some of the shows and concerts.

They both enjoyed many holidays on Britain's canals and as members of The Caravan Club enjoyed frequent caravanning trips, taking with them Pauline's parents and a succession of spaniels. These holidays were not without incident and Pauline often regaled us with some of the adventures. After Tony died in July 2019, Pauline made a few trips with the caravan and Chloe, their spaniel, to a favourite site in Devon, meeting up with friends they had known for many years.

During lockdown and right up to the week she became ill, she enjoyed playing her grand piano, learning new pieces and revisiting old favourites. It's a testimonial to Pauline that, since Tony's death and during lockdown, her neighbours, and friends from church and RPMG were always there to support and help her in so many ways.

Over the years she instilled her great love of music and music-making in church choirs, amateur singing groups, and in the hundreds of children and adults she taught to play the piano. Judging by the tributes from the many people who knew and kept in touch with her, she was well-loved and will be greatly missed by us all.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Blackberry and Raspberry Almond Bake

This is basically a pudding of fresh fruit incorporated into a sponge base. The sponge is made with ground almonds which give flavour, texture and moisture. It serves 8, but will keep in the 'frig. for a few days and would freeze. I like to use frozen fruit, then the juices will burst when you cut into them.

150g (5oz) unsalted butter

1 teaspn. vanilla extract

140ml maple syrup

3 medium eggs

300g (10oz) ground almonds

1 teaspn. baking powder

300g (10oz) mix of fresh or frozen fruits.

(blackcurrants give a tangy flavour)

cream, creme fraiche or yogurt to serve

Grease and line 20cm round or square tin. Easier with a loose bottom

Preheat oven 180C/160fan/Gas 4

Beat together softened butter, vanilla + maple syrup until smooth

Add 3 eggs gradually beating continually to combine

Fold in ground almonds + baking powder to mix

Scoop into tin and smooth the top

Gently press in all the berries until even

Bake for 40 minutes

(You can turn heat up a little for last 5 minutes for a golden top)

Leave to cool slightly

Delicious warm

A letter from our County Councillor, Rod Mckerlich

To enable electrification of the valleys lines, TfW has to replace a level crossing at Gelynis Farm with a bridge and also carry out substantial work on the track between Radyr and Pontypridd. To facilitate these works, TfW is negotiating a license to occupy a substantial part of Mound Field, Morganstown to create a temporary works compound. I completely approve the replacement of the level crossing and the benefits of valleys lines electrification; I can see other potential legacy benefits such as enhanced facilities for Radyr Rangers and some planning gain monies.; however, given past experience of dealing with projects carried out on behalf of railway companies, I am anxious that the benefits are not gained at the cost of considerable detriment to local residents over some three years.

Normally I would seek to control this mainly through planning conditions. However, the terms of the license to occupy could augment this by including sensible conditions. If TfW intend to behave reasonably that will present no difficulty; on the other hand, if they intend behaving like an occupying army (which the predecessor company has done elsewhere in my ward on numerous occasions) these conditions will be essential. As a starting point, these conditions should include hours of work, measures to restrict noise and light pollution, working practices, use of access road, repairs to access road, number and timing of HGV movements, car parking for staff and other users of Mound Field and S106 contributions. Based on the helpful and constructive attitude of the staff liaising with our community and the fact that TFW is owned by the Welsh Government, I hope that these will be agreed.

Many people also realised the importance of supporting local independent shops, which became "an essential haven" according to Nerys Howell, a food industry specialist and author of a new bilingual cookbook.


Bwyd Cymru yn ei Dymor / Welsh Food by Season (Y Lolfa) is full of both traditional and modern recipes that have been created by Nerys Howell. Nerys has appeared on BBC Radio Wales, BBC Radio Cymru as well as being a contributor to S4C's Prynhawn Da and a regular at Welsh food festivals. The book is a celebration of local, sustainable Welsh produce and aims to encourage people to eat seasonally.

Nerys says:

"Eating a diet full of local produce is important for our bodies, for our communities and the world in general. To make this happen we need to change how we perceive food. Instead of choosing what's convenient we must think what is at its best at particular times of the year. Apples are available from August to January, strawberries and tomatoes from May to September, and there are plenty of cabbages, onions and potatoes throughout the year. The taste of produce eaten in their season is so much better!"

Nerys Howell owns Cardiff-based food company Howel Food Consultancy and has years of experience of working in the food, drink and hospitality industry. Nerys says:

"After returning to Wales over twenty years ago I quickly realised that as a nation we were not the best for beating the drum about our fantastic produce and it has been my mission since then to share our secret. I feel passionate about the quality and choice of our produce here in Wales



and I'm keen to spread the word!"

Photographer Phil Boorman's wonderful images are a brilliant illustrative accompaniment to Nerys' tasty and nutritious recipes. The recipes are suitable for beginners and experienced cooks alike and offer ideas that will provide pleasure, enjoyment and of course good food.

The foreword has been written by farmer and television presenter Gareth Wyn Jones. Gareth says:

"As a farmer, I'm so pleased that Nerys has concentrated on local, seasonal and sustainable food in her new book. The meals in this brilliant book are a celebration of the choice of food and quality available to us in Wales. By supporting local produce we get an unique taste of an area, whether it be butter, cheese, meat or wine. I hope this book stimulates your pleasure in food and cooking and encourages us to buy locally and seasonally, and to grow food in a sustainable, healthy and environmentally-friendly way."

Nerys hopes the cookbook will also contribute to solving the wider challenges we face:

"I hope Welsh Food by Season will contribute towards further discussions about the future of the food chain in Wales, the importance of a healthy diet and the requirements of the future of our environment."

Nerys Howell has travelled all over the world promoting Welsh food and drink and has appeared on both radio and television programmes in both Welsh and English. She owns Howel Food, and her previous bilingual cookbook, *Cymru ar Blat / Wales on a Plate* (2009) reached the shortlist of Gourmand International Cookery Book Awards (2010).

Some of the recipes:

Spring

Laverbread breakfast burger; Sesame and soy salmon with spring greens; Honey, thyme and almond cake

Summer

Cardigan Bay crab cakes with cockle and laverbread sauce; Caerphilly cheese, onion and pepper tart; Summer fruit syllabub trifle

Autumn

Perl Las cheese and pear salad; Welsh beef, leek and rösti potato pie; Courgette, lime and pistachio loaf

Winter

Welsh beef winter salad; Venison sausages with leeks and ale; Beetroot and chocolate vegan cake

Remembrance Day

Like so much else this year, Remembrance Day was very different. A shorter service led by the Vicar and the Minister of the Methodist Church, followed by groups laying wreaths at various times during the day. It might have been less formal but it was no less moving. Vicki and Judith are to be congratulated on the service. In 1920 it was not the Portland stone edifice we know today that stood in London but a wood and plaster prototype designed by Sir Edward Lutyens.

British Legion Poppy Appeal

As a consequence of the COVID19 pandemic, the Royal British Legion decided to suspend all sales of poppies by means of the usual individual, door-to-door collections. Local organisers were, however, still able to make poppies available through key local outlets, where it was expected, suitable safety measures would be in place. This made it possible to promote the appeal through two of the Primary Schools in the Parish of Radyr, as well as a few well-patronised local retailers.

As a result, it is really pleasing to announce that the Appeal in the Radyr and Morganstown area has raised getting on for £1250. Regrettably, this is only about half the sum usually raised by our area, but nonetheless, a very worthwhile contribution to British Legion funds.

Most successful contributor was Bryn Deri Primary School, who raised over £473 mainly through sales of 'Kids' Pack' poppy-themed school items, such as rulers, pencils sharpeners and stylish wrist snapbands. That amount did, though, also include a substantial sum from a 5-kilometer run organised by school pupils' parents. As the other Primary School in the Parish of Radyr, Danescourt Primary raised over £261 through sales of poppies alone, closely followed by newsagents McColl's of Station Road, who raised over £232. Both Danescourt and Radyr Co-op stores also raised quite substantial sums.

Sincere thanks must go to our Primary School head teachers and staff – as well as parents – for their marvellous, continued support for the Appeal, as well as our local retailers.
